

For younger readers, make lists of rhyming words together. Which words rhyme but don't follow the same spelling pattern?</p> <p>3. Make a treasure hunt around the house. Read the clues to find the treasure at the end!</p>	<p>1. Create an obstacle course in the garden/house with different objects. Give directions to be able to complete it eg "forward 3 steps, turn right" or for older children "forward 3 steps, turn 90 degrees clockwise"</p> <p>2. Play hopscotch. Draw the grid on the path/driveway. Fill each box with a maths question rather than a number. If your stone lands on the box you need to work out the answer and then the answer is the number of jumps you have to make.</p>
